APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

All exchange students must be nominated by their home institution first. Next, each student must submit the following to Indiana University (you will apply as a "transfer" student):

- Online application to IU (includes personal information, academic background, essay, application fee of \$65, etc.)

Following your application, IU's Office of International Services (OIS) will email you to request that you set up an Atlas (international student portal) account and you must submit supporting documents:

- Academic records
- Financial documentation

J-1 STUDENT VISA

All international exchange students will be required to obtain a J-1 student visa before beginning their studies at IU.

After you have been notified of admission, you will need to provide financial documentation to the Office of International Services (OIS). You will also need to pay your SEVIS fee (~\$220 USD). OIS will then issue and send you a DS-2019 immigration document. You will use this DS-2019 to apply for a J-1 visa at the U.S. embassy in your home country. This typically involves an in-person interview at the embassy.

FINANCES

Tuition & Fees:

All tuition will be paid to your home institution. You will not pay any tuition to IU. However, you may be required to pay the mandatory IU student services fee which goes towards providing all students access to public transportation, the health center, workout facilities, etc.

Housing:

The O'Neill International Office is happy to assist you with locating affordable housing either on-campus or off-campus once you have been accepted to the exchange program.

Health Insurance:

All international students are required to have health insurance during their entire stay in the United States. IU offers a plan that international students are automatically enrolled in. If you have your own plan, you may apply for a waiver. Consult the OIS website for details:

CREDITS AND LANGUAGE

Undergraduate students must enroll in a minimum of 12 credit hours to maintain full-time status; however, most O'Neill students register for 15 credit hours per semester.

Courses are lecture based and taught directly by the professor. All courses are taught in English. Every professor will hold office hours that are highly recommended for you to attend. These hours are for you to meet with the professor after class to get a better understanding and answer any questions on course materials.

STUDENT LIFE IN BLOOMINGTON

About 80,000 people call the city of Bloomington home. It combines a small-town atmosphere with the amenities of a much larger city. WHAT TO DO ON THE WEEKEND?

The B-Line Trail is a multi-use trail that extends a total of 4.9 km from the west of town, through downtown, to the southern end of town. Walk, run, or bike the trail to see Bloomington from a new point of view and get some exercise along the way.

When the sun goes down the volume goes up. Whether you are looking to sit back and relax with a show or orchestra, laugh out loud with comedians, or rock out with a band, the nightlife is always diverse and exciting.

There is always something to do in downtown Bloomington! Any time of year you are sure to see festivals, street performances, street art, or concerts at the Buskirk-Chumley Theater.

Griffy Lake is a beautiful nature preserve located about 6 km from downtown Bloomington. The area offers great hiking trails that twist and turn around the lake with a trail for any level of hiker. In the warmer months rent a canoe, kayak, or paddleboard, and explore the lake at your own pace.
