Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ'S)

Welcome to the O'Neill School! We are happy to host you for your international research period. This guide will help answer the questions you have about your time here at Indiana University.

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Preparing for your time abroad

J-1 Process Timeline

1. Send J-1 visa documents to the O'Neill International Office (OIO)
2. Wait for approval of documents by the Office of International Services (OIS)
3. Wait to receive DS-2019 in mail
4. Start looking for housing in Bloomington
5. Receive DS-2019 in mail
6. Make visa appointment; bring all required documents to appointment
7. Wait to receive J-1 visa
8. Receive J-1 visa
9. Communicate with your faculty host about your research period, your goals for your time at O'Neill, connections you would like to make, etc.
10. Secure housing in Bloomington
11. Make travel arrangements to Bloomington
12. Keep your faculty host, OIO, and OIS updated on your arrival date
13. Upon arrival, email faculty host, OIO, and OIS to arrange orientations (see "[Orientations](#)" section below for more information).

Useful contacts and emails

IU is a very large university and therefore you will need to consult various offices and departments across campus for your questions. We recognize that this can be confusing! Please see below for a summary of who to go for what questions:

Your faculty host

For questions about your research period, resources for research, connections to other faculty and research groups, Bloomington recommendations (housing, schools, fun activities, etc.), how to get involved at O'Neill, on-campus, and in community, etc.

For questions about booking the shared office space, resources within O'Neill, housing information, setting up your IU email and account.

How do I find housing in Bloomington?

Visiting scholars are required to find their own housing that fits their needs for the research period in Bloomington. OIO and OIS cannot find housing for you. We recognize that arranging housing from abroad is complicated, so please closely review our detailed “Housing Guide for Visiting Scholars” (sent to you with this guide).

How do I set up an IU email account?

You will be able to set up your email account approximately one week before your arrival date using your 10-digit University ID number. To set up your IU email account, you will visit the [IU Account Management Services website](#). You will need to provide your last name, your date of birth and your University ID number. Please note that it can take 24-48 hours for your account to be activated once you have created it.

During the semester, you can access email using [One.IU](#). On this site, you will search “Exchange Online” in the top search bar. After clicking on Exchange Online, you will be taken to a login page. You will login using your IU username and passphrase. It is very important that you check your IU email at least once every couple of days (ideally, every day) during the semester. IU offices and faculty will use your IU email to contact you with important information.

Do I need health insurance?

Yes, you are required to have health insurance for the entire time you are in the U.S. You may either purchase insurance from IU, or use insurance from your home country. The U.S. Department of State mandates minimum coverage levels that your plan must meet:

\$100,000 for each sickness or illness (for women this must include maternity/pregnancy care)
\$100,000 for each accident or injury
\$50,000 for medical evacuation (in case you must return to your home country for medical care)
\$25,000 for repatriation (in case of death, this covers the cost of returning the body to the home country)

Additionally, your health insurance policy cannot have a deductible that exceeds \$500 per accident or illness. If you have dependents in the U.S., you must obtain qualifying health insurance for them, too.

Can I audit courses?

Auditing courses refers to taking a class for non-credit, meaning you take the class without getting a grade or IU credits. Scholars are able to sit in classes, participate in discussion, and complete assignments as if they were taking a class, but receive no grades or credits. This option is generally taken by scholars wishing to learn more on a particular subject while conducting their research. Although auditing courses is much cheaper than enrolling in them, university fees still apply.

As a visiting scholar, your primary purpose at IU must be research and therefore visiting scholars are limited to auditing one course per semester. Scholars interested in auditing a course will be responsible for paying all associated fees and costs. Scholars are only eligible to audit a course if they are staying for a **minimum of one semester** at Indiana University. We cannot process auditing forms in the middle of the semester, or for scholars who will not stay for the full semester.

How much does it cost to audit courses?

Auditing courses is completely optional and most visiting scholars opt not to. However, if you are interested in auditing a course, you will be responsible for all associated fees and costs.

Auditing costs \$25 per credit hour (~\$75 per class), plus campus fees detailed below. On top of these fees, you will be charged IU's standard International Student Fee which only applies to international students who enroll in courses (audit and for-credit). This fee ranges from \$350-\$700 depending on the # of credits you enroll in.

The tables below show Spring 2023 estimates for auditing of different credit hours. Prices generally escalate per course. Each course is usually 3 credit hours.

**The International Student Fee will apply as well – this is typically \$350 but can be more.*

How do I get a transcript of my audited course(s)?

You can find detailed and complete information on ordering or downloading your transcript on [this page](#).

You can download your unofficial IU Transcript in one.iu at [this link](#). This unofficial transcript will show the course you audited, the amount of credits it was, and that you took the course for noncredit (NC). Unofficial transcripts are free to access and download, there is no cost.

If you need an official transcript, you can order an eTranscript to be sent via email to you or your home institution. You will order the transcript at one of these links depending on your status at the time of ordering: [eTranscript Request for Recent Students](#) or [eTranscript Request for Former Students](#). Official eTranscripts cost \$10 and are emailed to the recipient – you will receive these immediately. Official printed transcripts cost \$15 and are sent via post to the recipient – you will receive these in 4-6 weeks if sending to an international location.

Getting to Bloomington

Which airport is the closest to Bloomington?

The [Indianapolis International Airport](#) (IND) is the closest airport to Bloomington – it is about an hour away by car/bus. The Indianapolis Airport is well-connected to major hubs like Chicago, Detroit, New York, and DC. You will most likely connect at one of these cities before making your way to Indianapolis.

Before booking your flight, please make sure that you are going to arrive in time to check in to your lodging. Many apartment complexes in Bloomington are unable to give people their keys after 5 pm when their offices close. If you cannot arrive in time to check in, you will need to reserve a hotel room for the night.

How do I get from the Indianapolis Airport to Bloomington?

We would highly recommend viewing a [short video](#) by the Office of International Services (OIS) which provides useful tips on getting through the Indianapolis airport and finding transportation to Bloomington.

The cheapest option is the [airport shuttle](#) (\$29 each way) – the shuttle takes students and scholars from the airport and drops them off at locations around the IU campus and city of Bloomington. The shuttle is scheduled for certain times so you may have to wait for it to arrive at the airport after your land. Make sure to find the closest shuttle stop to your lodging in Bloomington using a map.

Uber/Lyft are the most convenient as you can find a driver immediately after landing and collecting your luggage and start your journey to Bloomington right away. However, it can be expensive (\$50-\$100+).

Getting settled

Where can I get cash?

If you plan to exchange currency in the United States, you will want to do so when you arrive in the airport. Unfortunately, there are no currency exchange offices in Bloomington. However, please keep in mind that you should be able to withdraw money at an ATM using a credit or debit card from your home country. You will want to talk to your bank about potential fees involved for using the ATM.

How can I access the Internet on campus?

To access the internet from your phone or laptop while on campus, you will connect to the IU Secure WiFi network. You can connect to this network using your IU username and passphrase from your email account. For details about connecting to IU Secure, please visit the [IU Secure website](#).

If your IU username and passphrase are not yet working when you arrive on campus, you can use the IU Guest WiFi network, provided by the university, to connect to the Internet. To connect, make sure your device's wireless networking (Wi-Fi) is turned on, and select the "IU Guest" network. You will need to enter your non-IU email address to access the network.

How do I get a cellphone?

Cell phone companies offer both postpaid and prepaid services. For a detailed description of these services, please visit the Office of International Services (OIS) [website](#). Please note that it is possible to use your phone from your home country; however, you may need to buy a new SIM card.

There are several cell phone companies in Bloomington where you can purchase a phone and/or phone plan. Many are located at College Mall on the East Side of Bloomington.

What is a CrimsonCard?

A [CrimsonCard](#) is Indiana University's identification (ID) card for faculty, staff, students, and scholars. Your CrimsonCard shows your name, photo, and identifies you as a scholar at IU. It allows you to ride Bloomington and IU buses for free, check out materials at the library, and print course materials. You

can also [deposit money](#) on your CrimsonCard to pay for things like printing, food on-campus, etc. As part of your welcome orientation, someone from the O'Neill International Office will take you to get your CrimsonCard. You cannot get this until you have arrived on campus.

Where can I print course materials?

There are printing stations located all across campus, including in the O'Neill building, Wells Library, and the Indiana Memorial Union (IMU). You can print from either an IU computer or your personal computer. If you print from an IU computer, your print will automatically be sent to a printing station. If you want to print from your personal computer, you will need to first install IU printing software. Instructions on how to do this can be found [here](#). Once you have submitted your print job, you will go to a printing station and swipe your CrimsonCard. Your print job will appear on the screen and you can then select it to print.

What kind of academic resources does IU offer?

There are several libraries located across campus. [Herman B Wells library](#), the largest, is located just across the street from O'Neill. In addition to containing multiple IU departments, the Wells library also offers tech support, printing and computer help, and software and technology training in the [Wells Learning Commons](#) on the first floor. This is a great resource if you are having any computer or technology problems with which you need assistance. Wells library also has a number of eateries and cafes located on the bottom floor.

IU also offers many featured online resources which can be used to locate relevant articles [and other academic materials](#). [A list of these online resources can be found on the IU libraries website](#). [For most of these resources, you will be required to login with your IU username and](#) passphrase before accessing them.

You are also able to access software packages for free using [IUware](#) or [IUanyWare](#). IUware allows you to download software packages such as Adobe and Microsoft Office and install them on your computer for free. IUanyWare is a client virtualization service which allows IU students, faculty and staff to use a web browser or mobile app to run certain IU-licensed software applications without having to install them on your computer or mobile device.

Can I have an office?

Yes, O'Neill offers a shared office space, room 375L, in the O'Neill building for visiting scholars. This is a private office with a desk, office supplies, and white board. [Scholars can reserve the 375L by emailing oio@indiana.edu with the dates/times during which you would like to use the office.](#)

Once you have your IU email set up and have access to Outlook, you can request to book 375L yourself within the Outlook Scheduling Assistant. Instructions below:

- *Open Outlook*
- *Go to Calendar*
- *Click "New appointment"*
- *Click "Location"*

- *In top left search bar, type “BL-SPEA” and click the arrow button*
- *Scroll through options to find and select “O’Neill School Bloomington Conference Room PV-375L”*
- *Click “Rooms”*
- *Click “OK”*
- *Pick times you would like to reserve the room*
- *Enter your name in the appointment title section*
- *Send request and wait for OIO to approve or decline*

In addition to the O’Neill shared visiting scholar office space, there are several study and work spaces on campus that scholars can take advantage of. The [Business/SPEA Library](#), located in the basement of the O’Neill building, has quiet individual work stations. In addition, the [Herman B Wells Library](#), located right across the street from O’Neill, rents out graduate student study carrels (i.e. small cubicles in quiet sections of the library which you can use). It is free to rent out your own study carrel. To do so, you will need to complete the [Wells Library Graduate Carrel](#) request form online.

Where can I get groceries?

Bloomington has many grocery stores, but they are not always located within walking distance of lodging and neighborhoods. Depending on where your lodging is located, you will likely be near some kind of grocery store. Some examples below:

How can I get around Bloomington if I don't have a car?

IU students and scholars have access to both campus and city bus services.

The **Campus Bus** Service provides basic transportation on campus. You do not need to show any form of ID or pass to ride a campus bus. Campus buses have a letter in front of them. A list of campus bus schedules and routes can be found [here](#).

The **City of Bloomington Bus** provides bus service on and off campus. If you are riding on a city bus, you must show your CrimsonCard to the bus driver as you are getting on the bus. City buses have a number in front of them. A list of city bus schedules and routes can be found [here](#).

Both bus services offer live bus tracking, so that you can see how close a bus is to you. You can use the [DoubleMap service](#) online or download the DoubleMap app on your smart phone. If you are unsure of how to get from your apartment to O'Neill, you can use [Google Maps](#) to enter your address, select Directions, and then enter O'Neill's address (1315 East Tenth Street, Bloomington, IN, 47405). If you click on the bus icon, it will tell you the bus route you need to take. Please note that campus and city bus schedules change on holidays or during school breaks.

Uber/Lyft are also common options for getting a ride to and from places. For safety reasons, please remember to always verify that the license plate on the app matches the license plate on the vehicle before getting in.

Zipcar – the world's largest car sharing and car club service that is an alternative to traditional car rental and car ownership. More information can be found [here](#).

Bicycles are also a popular option for Bloomington residents. There are many different bike shop options, and many people sell used bikes on IU Classifieds and FB Marketplace as well. Bicycle theft is the most common criminal activity in Bloomington.

How can I set up a bank account in Bloomington?

Although it is not mandatory, if you choose to set up a bank account in the United States, there are several banks in Bloomington. Two of the most common bank options in Bloomington are IU Credit Union and Chase Bank. If you are planning to travel within the United States during your stay, Chase may be a better option for you. Because it is a national bank, you will be able to withdraw money from ATM's and not have to pay a fee. Both banks have multiple locations close to campus.

For each bank, you will need the following documents to set up an account:

DS-2019

Proof of local residence (this would take the form of a contract or lease with your apartment company)

Minimum \$25 USD in cash

IU Credit Union

Passport

DS-2019

Second form of ID (usually scholars use their CampusAccess card. However, it just needs to be something with your picture and name on it)

Minimum \$5 USD in cash

You will want to talk to the banks individually about any fees associated with setting up an account.

How do I get involved on campus?

We encourage you to work closely with your faculty to host for help getting involved in O'Neill and campus activities related to your research. Faculty hosts can include you in research groups, invite you to lecture and seminar series related to your research, help connect you to other faculty and students, and more.

Is Bloomington safe?

Bloomington is generally a very safe place. However, it is important to be aware of your surroundings and to know which safety and emergency assistance resources are available to you. Indiana University and the city of Bloomington offer a number of resources in order to keep you safe.

Emergencies: 9-1-1

In addition to using your own phone to call 911, you will notice that there are phones with blue

lights all over campus. These phones have a red button that can be pressed to immediately call 911 in the event of an emergency, and the location of the blue light is automatically communicated to the police.

IUPD-Bloomington: 812-855-4111

IUPD is IU's very own police department that operates all day, every day. You will frequently see IUPD driving around campus.

Safety Escort: 812-855-SAFE (7233)

Safety Escort is a student-run transportation service for IU Bloomington students and staff as an alternative to walking alone at night. It is free of charge. Hours are Sunday through Thursday from 8 p.m. to 11:45 p.m.

What types of restaurants does Bloomington have?

Bloomington is home to an abundance and variety of restaurants. The 4th Street area downtown features the second largest per-capita number of international restaurants in the United States with cuisine ranging from Tibetan to Thai to Indian. Kirkwood Avenue and downtown Bloomington around the square are also full of restaurants. Most restaurants will have both meat and vegetarian and vegan friendly options. Some Bloomington favorite restaurants include: Uptown Café (great breakfast), The Owlery (vegetarian comfort food), Samira (Afghani specialties), and Mother Bears (delicious pizza).

Can I use the IU gyms?

You will be able to use the IU gyms if you pay for an [IU Rec Sports membership or day-pass](#). If you are interested in getting a membership or day-pass, you will want to visit either the Student Recreational Sports Center (SRSC), located on 1601 Law Lane, or the Bill Garrett Fieldhouse, located on 1025 E. 7th Street. Both gyms are very close to the O'Neill School.

At the SRSC or Fieldhouse, you will go to the Membership Services desk and ask to sign up for a membership. Bring your IU CrimsonCard when you go to set up your membership or purchase a day-pass. This will make the process simpler.

Please note that if you are auditing a course during your stay, you may be eligible to pay a lower student rate for a membership. You will need to consult the Registrar at reghelp@iu.edu regarding whether your audit enrollment will include the student activity fee and therefore access to the gyms.

Are there ways to improve my English while I am here?

Throughout the fall and spring semesters, the Office of International Services offers [Practical English Tutorials \(PET\)](#). These tutorials offer international students and scholars the opportunity to talk with native English speakers on a wide variety of topics, including slang, holidays and American culture.

Orientations

What do I need to do when I get to Bloomington?

There are three orientations that you will need to attend upon arrival in Bloomington, please read more about them below:

1. OIS Scholar Check-in

Within the first week of your arrival in Bloomington, you are required to check-in at the Office of International Services (OIS). You will need to choose a time to go to OIS from the time options below. You do not need to make an appointment, you will just arrive at OIS during one of the timeframes below:

OIS Scholar Check-in is available Monday – Friday from 9-11am or 1-3pm at OIS, located in the Ferguson International Center at 330 N Eagleson Avenue on the IU Campus. **The OIS Scholar Check-in is required.**

You must bring immigration documents (passport with visa stamp, DS2019 document, etc.) and local living address information to the check-in.

2. OIS New Scholar Orientation

In addition to the OIS check-in, you will need to attend the OIS New Scholar Orientation. This orientation will help you understand important guidelines for your research stay, understand the parameters of your J-1 visa, and will answer any questions you may have.

OIS New Scholar Orientation is scheduled on Friday mornings at 10 a.m. Scholars will be assigned an orientation appointment time upon completion of the check in process. The orientation will take place at OIS, located in the Ferguson International Center at 330 N Eagleson Avenue on the IU Campus. **The New Scholar Orientation is required, you must attend your assigned session.**

3. O’Neill New Scholar Orientation

At this O’Neill-specific orientation, you will meet the staff of OIO, go over the FAQ sheet, take a tour of the building, see the office space you can work in, see the library and café, and answer any question you may have.

Someone from OIO will contact you about setting up a time and day for your O’Neill Orientation. The O’Neill New Scholar Orientation will take place at the O’Neill International Office in SPEA Room 201 in the O’Neill School building at 1315 E Tenth Street. **The O’Neill Orientation is required.**
